Though only mentioned this one time, this story gives us an important insight as to how Jesus operated as the Messiah and what he expected of his followers.

In verse 4, we come to an interesting use of language for the Gospel writer John:

“(Jesus) got up from the table, **1took off** his outer robe and **2tied** a towel around himself.”


The words that I numbered, italicized, and bolded are the words I want to focus on. These words from the original Greek aren't actually the words "took off" or "tied". These are just words used to make this story flow better in the English translation. To give you a better definition of these words, I'll use a couple of verses from John chapter 10 (same author and same Gospel) that uses both of these verbs in a better context so you can see what I mean. John 10:17-18:

"For this reason the Father loves me, because I **1lay down** my life in order to **2take it up** again. No one **2takes** it from me, but I **1lay** it down on my own accord."

When John tells us about how Jesus approached washing the disciples' feet, he uses the same language as he did just a few chapters before when Jesus was alluding to the cross. Jesus "laid down" his robe and "took up" the towel. Sometimes we think that taking up our cross means to physically die, but in a much more real, concrete sense, Jesus calls us to "lay down" our selfish ambitions and to "take up" serving others. The Gospel isn't necessarily about dying for your friend as much as it is helping your friend when it is most inconvenient for you.

"So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done."
