Worship

This week we are talking about worship. Worship a lot of times is something that we think of just taking place in the church but all of life can be and should be worship.

In this sense that everything we do can be done and should be done is response to God's grace, all of life is worship. Running, baking, sharing a conversation, waking up, lying down, anything you do in gratitude to God is worship. We can grow to a place where we constantly acknowledge God's presence and-in this sense-continually worship.

You've probably seen those shirts that say, "Football is life..."

I am regularly asked, by people who are in pain, by people who are at the end of their rope, and by people who desperately want to help, this question "What can we do?"

When we face the brokenness of the world with worship, heaven crashes into earth.
